Chicago Chapter

Well! The members of the Chicago Chapter were delighted to welcome our new director, Lisette Kielson, to our September meeting, and she got right to work.



She handed out music for several upcoming events for us to work on in October and November, and beyond, and to practice at home. What's coming up?

- 1. The Harold Washington Library Center at 400 South State Street in downtown Chicago offers free concerts in their first floor lobby at noon every day for the first two weeks of December. We signed up to perform at noon on Friday, December 13. So far eight of our members plan to participate; we will gather by 11:45 and play for an hour. The HWLC has its own Loop L stop and is close to all of the suburban Metra stations.
- 2. We are also inviting members to take part in John Langfeld's concert on April 27 at 4 PM at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Luke, 1500 W Belmont. The plan is to perform a transcription of Queen's *Bohemian Rhapsody* for recorder orchestra, with string bass and keyboard and as many recorder players as we can fit on the stage.
- 3. We are probably going to make plans to hold an open rehearsal as a chapter in March, for Play the Recorder Month, at a public location.
- 4. And we will be building a repertoire for Make Music Chicago on June 21, 2014. This annual

event featured 180 free performances from 1000 musicians in 2013, in venues all over the city, all day long.

For our October 20 meeting, we will play through our holiday music from 2 to 3:15 for our performance opportunity at the Library on December 13. From 3:30 to 5 PM we will continue to work on a broader range of music as part of Lisette's "Music through the Ages" theme, for June 21. Lisette will hand out new music for both events; those of you who joined us in September, please bring your copies of the music along.

West Suburban Early Music Society

The West Suburban Early Music Society started off our 2013-14 season by ratifying our new board. Officers are Convener: Laura Kuhlman, Vice-Convener: Marguerite Ré, Secretary and Membership: Kathy Hall-Babis, and Hospitality: Chris Culp.

For our big-group playing, Laura introduced us to two pieces by the 16th composer Salamone Rossi. We played a setting of the Jewish prayer *Barchu* and a Simfonia. The pieces were beautiful, and it looks like we have more chances to explore this under-appreciated composer. After the break, we split up into our three groups. Jim Heup led the "alto leftovers" in a three part Waltz-Canon he brought back from the Boston Early Music Festival. The piece was composed in 2008 by Melika M. Fitzhugh. We spent the rest of the time working on a two part sonata by English compose William Croft (1678-1727).

Our next meeting will be on October 13 at 2 PM at the Naperville Covenant Church. Hope to see everyone there!—*Eric Stern*

The library group was also busy. Nancy Good sent this report. Last year, the Library Group looked at Renaissance and Baroque music, namely, their characteristics and what makes them different. We found fun-to-play music, and enjoyed both familiar and new (to us) pieces. This year, we're looking at music from around the world. In September, we started with Latin America, including South America, Mexico, and the Caribbean. The arrangements were not hard, but the rhythmic nature of this music came through, especially when we added some percussion. Jamaica is a happy place to start. We played "Yellow Bird' and the "Mango Walk". When the Spanish came to Mexico, they brought the tune "La Cucaracha" with them. Before the Spanish, Portuguese, and all the other colonial powers came, the Incas had their own music. We played "Little Finch," which definitely has a different sound. I brought lots more music, including a dance, a lullaby, and a set of Renaissance music written in Guatemala. Never enough

time! But in October, we move on to Eastern Europe. If anyone knows of simple music from Asia or Africa to add to my collections so far, let me know.—*Nancy Good*

Memberships Due

Membership fees for 2013-2014 for the American Recorder Society are now due. The national dues are \$45 a year; for the Chicago chapter the dues are \$25, and for West Suburban, \$15. For both memberships send \$70 to Esther Schechter (6747 S. Constance Ave., Chicago, IL 60649-1015) for Chicago or \$60 for West Suburban to Nancy Good (741 Willow, Naperville, IL 60540-7421). Members are listed in the ARS directory, and receive *The American Recorder* magazine, music, and access to musical resources. Please consider being generous for the coming year!

Note that the American Recorder Society has a new Member Management System that allows members to renew online with a credit card. Many members of the Chicago Chapter and WSEMS renew their local and national memberships jointly each year, but it is easy to deal directly with the ARS as well.

Also, dues will increase in January of 2014. Current members are welcome to lock in the current rate for two years if they like. This is the first dues increase for the ARS since 2007, and it helps the Society keep pace with increases in postage and printing costs. The increase will also help finance several new projects, such as the newly reworked web page.

- For the USA, regular membership is \$50 for one year and \$90 for two years.
- For Canada, \$55 for one year and \$100 for two years (the difference is justified by the increase in US postal rates to Canada).

The Chicago Chapter Kroesen Fund

About 15 years ago the Chicago chapter set up the Kroesen Education Fund, intended to help finance scholarships and outreach efforts. Bob & Diane Stehman, a couple active in the chapter at the time, provided the initial capital, and members were encouraged to contribute. The board has sought to make prudent use of these funds over the years. The chapter's general operating income and expenses were handled separately.

The chapter's income is mostly in the form of membership contributions, and our expenses mostly involve covering the costs for our meeting place and monthly director. Sometimes we also turn a "profit" from our April workshops at Concordia University, though for the 2013 event we needed to subsidize it by about \$240. If you are a chapter member, we will provide you with a detailed financial statement on request.

Recently the board voted to merge the Krosen fund into our regular operating fund, to help finance chapter operations for the next two years. We also encourage members to consider contributing beyond their regular dues. The board voted to donate \$300 to the American Recorder Society out of this balance in memory of Harry & Jean Kroesen. The Kroesens were among the earliest members of the Chicago chapter, which was formally chartered in January of 1963 by the American Recorder Society. Chicago is the third oldest chapter in the nation; the Chicago chapter held its first concert in May of 1959, and last month the ARS recognized the chapter's 55 years of service.

Jeanne Hyde Kroesen (1911-1999) was an avid recorder player who joined the Oak Park Recorder Society and the Chicago chapter in the early 1960s. She was initially hired as a proofreader by Commerce Clearing House, Inc., a legal publishing firm, and eventually worked her way up to become a vice president. She developed a grammar and punctuation test for editors and proofreaders, but it was so difficult that no one could complete it perfectly. She married Harry Kroesen and took his surname, but her employees at CCH insisted on referring to her, until the very end, as Miss Hyde.

Harry and Jeanne regularly traded the secretary and treasurer positions on the board every two years, alternating so as to comply with the rules that no person could hold the same board position for more than two years in a row. Jeanne provided refreshments (complete with a table cloth) at every meeting and she and Hildé Staniulis always called all the members to recruit new officers and to remind others to pay their dues. Harry was most comfortable on bass and great bass, Jeanne liked alto, sometimes played tenor and, rarely, soprano.

At Jeanne's funeral in September of 1999, at the Third Unitarian Church of Chicago, the Oak Park Recorder Society performed several pieces, including "Ever Loving Shepherd" by Handel, an arrangement dedicated to Harry & Jeanne by the Chicago Chapter in 1961.
