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Chicago Chapter

For our November meeting we played recorder.

We are getting ready. To prepare for our December 13 performance at the library, Lisette devoted the November meeting to running through our Christmas music. So we played through 19 different pieces, mostly traditional Christmas melodies. We can still make room for new participants if you would like to join us.

We are looking for members interested in participating in an hour-long class in the afternoon of February 15 for the Saturday workshop of the University of Chicago Folk Music Festival. The annual Folk Music Festival has been delighting crowds of musicians and music lovers for over 50 years, offering concerts and classes featuring Cajun dance, Russian folk choirs, blue grass, gospel and Irish fiddle ensembles, English Country Dance, and much more, besides spontaneous jam sessions. The free workshops are offered all day on Saturday and Sunday at the wonderful Ida Noyes Hall, 1212 East 59th Street in Hyde Park. Lisette Kielson will direct the class, and we plan to invite participants to join us in a general jam and coaching session. We would like some chapter members to take part to demonstrate our instruments and play several pieces for whoever drops in.

We are also recruiting members and friends to join John Langfeld in performing an arrangement of Queen's 1975 master work "Bohemian Rhapsody" for recorder at on Sunday, April 27 at 2 PM at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Luke, 1500 West Belmont in Chicago. John is trying to recruit as many recorder players as he can to form an orchestra for this piece. Our own Lisette Kielson, Patrick O'Malley, and Laura Kuhlman will be taking part in the concert as well. John looks to have one rehearsal and then a dress rehearsal on Saturday April 26. You can reach John at langfeldjohn@gmail.com. He will be happy to send a score—38 pages!—by email, for two soprano, two alto, two tenor, and two bass recorders, plus harpsichord.

Further, the board is considering a performance or an open practice session for Play the Recorder Month in March. We may move the monthly meeting site to a more public venue; one idea that we are considering is performing at the Oak Park Public Library on Lake Street. We hope this would be easily accessible to all of

our members, and it would give us another opportunity to share our music with a larger audience.

Patrick O'Malley will open 2014 by directing the group for our January 19, and will help us work on the music we are planning to perform for Make Music Chicago June 21. Andrew Schultze directs on February 16, this time teaching about the music of the German Baroque era, and he plans to bring several singers along.

Finally, keep in mind plans for the memorial gathering for Ann Greene on Saturday afternoon, noon to 4 PM, December 14 in Schaumburg. We have been invited to bring music and our instruments to remember Ann by playing some of her favorite melodies. The event will be at the Maggiano's Little Italy Restaurant in Schaumburg, 1901 East Woodfield Road, just south of Woodfield Mall in the Streets of Woodfield shopping center.

A Season of Excellent Music

Members of the Chicago Chapter will gather in the lobby of the Harold Washington Library Center, 400 South State Street, on Friday December 13 at noon to perform holiday music for library patrons. The Chicago Public Library will publicize this event. For those who are performing, please be ready to play by 11:45. The multi-purpose room on the lower level will be available for storing coats and bags and for tuning up before the event. Make sure you bring your music and music stands.

The library has its own Loop elevated stop, and is easily accessible by Metra train from the suburbs. If you prefer to drive, the library web site offers a list of 16 lots and garages within a few blocks, including CPS Parking at 651 South State, Park One at 18 E Van Buren, and four Park One sites between 410 & 605 South Wabash.

The day before, the Pippins will gather to sing in the same space, at the same time, and at 6:30 that evening in Daley Plaza, as part of Christkindlemarket. And you can find the Pippins are also singing as part of the Forest Park Holiday Walk on Friday, December 6, in the evening. Madison Avenue in Forest Park, around Circle Avenue (just west of Harlem Avenue) features horse-drawn sleigh rides, face painting, and a visit of Santa, starting at 6 PM.

Members of the West Suburban Early Music Society, including Jim Heup, Bob Blomeyer, Marguerite Re, and Nancy Good, will be providing dinner music on Thursday evening, December 12 for the Children's Christmas Party, Bridge Communities in Naperville. Bridge Communities is a non-profit that provides support for homeless families in DuPage County. They will be performing at the DuPage Children's Museum in Naperville.

Patrick O'Malley will play recorder with the Chorale of the Music Institute of Chicago on December 15 at 3 PM in Evanston, 1490 Chicago Avenue. The WSEMS November meeting was arranged in reverse order from usual. We began with our small groups. The "Leftovers" enjoyed playing another sonata for two altos by William Croft. Normally, I don't talk about the krumhorn group because they only engage in unspeakable activities, but this month they cleaned up their act. The krumhorns played pieces from the 2nd volume of Music for Krumhorns covering such goodies as *Roma Non Fu* (L. Agostini, *Ohn dick Muss Ich* (L. Lechner) and *Gavotte* (Praetorius). After the break, we

resumed with our large group led by Laura Kuhlman. We played the Hebrew song *Elohim Hashivenu* by Salamone Rossi, *Nous sommes de l'ordre de St. Babuyn* from the Odhecaton and a new piece *Ihr Musici frisch auf* by Hans Leo Hassler.

Meanwhile, the Senior Suburban Orchestra, conducted by Dan Pasquale D'Andrea was founded in September of 2000. The Orchestra recently added a recorder quartet made up of players from within the orchestra, and including WSEMS member Darleen Kay.

Music Coming Up

Schola Antiqua offers "Thomas Becket: Martyr and Athlete" on January 10 at 7:30 PM, Rockefeller Chapel, 5850 South Woodlawn, near the University of Chicago, and again on January 11 at 8 PM at St. Clement Church, 642 West Deming Place in Lincoln Park (Chicago). The program of music speaks of England's legendary martyr, the Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Becket. After his death Thomas was honored in gestures of cultural expression, including music. Songs for the liturgy were matched by sounds for the saint to be used outside the church's walls. Music from the thirteenth century through the fifteenth century, across a number of genres, retells the story of Thomas as a martyr and "athlete" (a champion of Jesus), as one song calls him.

The **Haymarket Opera** just completed a delightful series of performances of Georg Philipp Telemann's comic opera *Pimpinone* (1725) at the Mayne Stage in Chicago, 1328 West Montrose. Their next performance features *Le Judgement de Pan/Acteon by* the French composer Marc-Antoine Charpentier (1643-1704). It is worth writing this one in your calendar for March 7 at 7:30 and March 8 at 5 and 8 PM because this work will feature

It features music by Guillaume Dufay, Giles Binchois, and others, but, alas, not the elephants and musicians enclosed in enormous pastries that Good Philip also provided for his guests. February 7, 8 PM, Ruggles Hall, Newberry Library, February 8, 8 PM, Lutkin Hall, Northwestern University, February 9, 3 PM, Bond Chapel, University of Chicago. Rook will perform at the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert, in Preston Bradley Hall at the Chicago Cultural Center, on Wednesday, February 19 at 12:15. The program will include works by Castello, Weckmann, Selma y Salaverde, Willaert and Festa. Rook is a mixed instrument ensemble, including harpsichord, violin, bass violin, and trombone, that plays music of the 16th and 17th centuries.
