Chicago Chapter News

An excellent turnout for our annual Yuletide Concert December 18 at Covenant Presbyterian, nearly 30 musicians and a crowd besides. The Chicago Recorder Quartet distinguished themselves again, but all around the quality of the music making was excellent, with a lively mix of Renaissance and 20th and 21st century works, Hassler and Holst, Poulenc and Coprario, Glenn Shannon and anonymous works written 700 years ago. After the reception eight of us joined Nancy Chabala to jam for another 45 minutes, before we closed another pleasant set of concert memories.

If we have enough participants, we will also work on the *Second Suite in F for Military Band* by Gustav Holst.

Spring Recorder Workshop, April 2017

We are pleased to welcome Anne Timberlake for our next recorder workshop on April 8, 2017 at Covenant Presbyterian Church, 2012 West Dickens. This is our regular monthly meeting place. We will play all day, starting at 9:30 and ending at 4 with a break for lunch, and will start with an hour or two of work on how, where, and why to articulate with recorder, and then move into the workshop theme, "Bad Boys."

Does character count? Can you be both tuneful and badly behaved? We'll sample the music of

spies, lechers, debtors, drunkards, murderers, and cranks. It's malfeasance through the ages!



Anne Timberlake has appeared across the United States performing repertoire from Bach to twenty-first-century premieres. She holds degrees in recorder performance from Oberlin Conservatory and Indiana University, where she won the 2007 Early Music Institute Concerto Competition. She has also received awards from the American Recorder

Society and the National Foundation for the Advancement of the Arts, and was awarded a Fulbright Grant. With Musik Ekklesia, Anne has recorded for the Sono Luminus label, and is a founding member of the Wayward Sisters, specializing in music of the early baroque. In 2011 the Wayward Sisters won Early Music America's Naxos Recording Competition.

Anne enjoys teaching as well as playing. Besides her own studio, Anne has coached through Indiana University's Pre-College Recorder Program, the Amherst Early Music Festival, the San Francisco Early Music Society, and the Virginia Baroque Performance Institute. Students have ranged in age from age 5 to 83, and from beginning to pre-professional.

The fee will be \$65 for members and \$75 for nonmembers. Lunch is on your own, but we can walk to any one of several restaurants near the site of the workshop.

Covenant Presbyterian Church is at 2012 West Dickens in the Bucktown neighborhood of Chicago, near Damen and Armitage and near exit 47 on the Kennedy expressway. Street parking is available, and a lot behind the church on Charleston may have spaces. The church is also easily accessible by public transportation. Take the Blue line elevated train to either Damen or Western Avenue and walk (www.transitchicago.com), or take either the #49 Western Avenue Bus or the #50 Damen Avenue bus. The church is also near the Clybourn stop on the Metra Union Pacific North and North West train lines (www.metrarail.com).

Music Coming Up

University of Chicago Presents offers two early music concerts early in 2017. The first involves dueling lutes played by Paul O'Dette and Ronn McFarlane in *Two Lutes: Virtuoso Duets from Italy and England.* Logan Center of the Arts, 915 E 60th Street, on Sunday January 8 at 3 PM. Join a pre-concert lecture at 2 PM. Tickets are \$35, and available at the University of Chicago box office or at their web site, chicagopresents.uchicago.edu.

Then, the British choral group Stile Antico performs on Friday March 3 at 7:30 PM at Rockefeller Chapel, 5850 South Woodlawn. These tickets are also \$35. The concert features works by Catholic composers who left England during the reign of Queen Elizabeth, including John Dowland, Peter Philips, and William Byrd. Tickets for *In a Strange Land: Elizabethan Composers in Exile* are also \$35 and are available at the University of Chicago Presents web site.

New Comma Baroque—"Bold Historically Informed Performance. Period." That's what they say on their web site. And I'm confident in this marketing strategy, though I'm not sure about the name (New *Comma?*). But the advertising that clinches the sale for me would be found in their list of guest artists, which includes one Lisette Kielson, as well as regular Philip Serna, a regular member playing gamba.

Enjoy a performance of the Complete Viol Fantasies by Georg Philip Telemann. The collection, a set of works for viola da gamba self-published in 1735, and written for an instrument that had already fallen out of fashion in Europe, was rediscovered in 2014. They perform at North Central College, Naperville, Illinois Tuesday, March 14 at 7 PM (Koten Chapel at Kiekhofer Hall). Other performances available at Valparaiso University in Indiana, Peoria, Illinois, and St. Louis, Missouri. All are free and open to the public. Phillip Serna also offers a recital at Jeanne Vail Chapel at Northwestern University in Evanston on Thursday, January 19 at 7:30 PM. The European Day of Early Music is held every March 21, Johann Sebastian Bach's birthday. For the Day of Early Music over 1000 years of music is represented, written down or transmitted orally, from the Middle Ages until the late 1700s.



"The European Day of Early Music aims to increase awareness of the music from the medieval, renaissance and baroque periods and bring it to the attention of a wider audience." The event regularly features dozens of concerts and events across Europe (and the United States), with the music also being offered by live streaming online. Bach Week Festival returns with two concerts at the Music Institute of Chicago, 1490 Chicago Avenue in Evanston Friday April 28 and Friday May 5, both at 7:30, and a Sunday afternoon concert on May 7 at 2:30 at Anderson Chapel of North Park University, Foster and Spaulding in Chicago. Single tickets are \$30; visit bachweek.org or call 800 838-3006. A fundraising house concert is also planned for Sunday March 19 at 5:30 at the Charles Gates Dawes House 225 Greenwood Street in Evanston. Tickets are \$60.

This is the 44th annual Bach Week event. The May 7 finale features the choral motet *Jesu*, *meine Freude* and the Orchestral Suite #4 in D. A pair of keyboard concerti are offered for May 5, and Cantatas 54 and 202 on April 28, along with a pair of soprano duets.

An excellent opportunity to experience **Sacred Harp Singing** approaches on Sunday, January 8. The 32nd annual Chicago Anniversary Singing is scheduled for the Kilbourn Park Fieldhouse, 3501 North Kilbourn Avenue on the northwest side, 10 AM to 3:30 PM, registration

starting at 9:30. Besides the amazing (and loud!) tradition itself, enjoy an equally amazing pot luck lunch. Typically this event draws over 100 people to the hollow square, leading to a full-throated sound. Loaner hymnals available. Visit www.chicagosingings.org.
