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Chicago Chapter News

Dennis Sherman gallantly directed the March 19 meeting of the Chicago Chapter as a competitive event.

The members who attended cast a wistful ear toward Byron Colby Barn in Grayslake, where the Chicago Recorder Quartet, Lisette Kielson, Patrick O'Malley, Laura Osterlund, and Mirja Lorenz, were performing. Or maybe they thought about playing in or attending a concert also on that Sunday afternoon, March 19, at the Music Institute of Chicago, "Sing and We Play It," that celebrated the 30th anniversary of the MIC Chorale. The concert also featured their viol da gamba ensemble and members of the MIC Recorder Orchestra.

The Chicago Chapter spent the afternoon playing selections from the Odhecaton. More properly named "Harmonice Musices Odhecaton," the collection was published in three editions in 1501, 1503, and 1504 by Ottaviano Petrucci, and is the first polyphonic music printed with moveable type. The typesetter printed in three passes, first the musical staffs, then the words, and finally, the notes. The playlist included works by Josquin Desprez, Heinrich Isaac, Loyset Compere, and Alexander Agricola. There are more pieces by composer Jean Japart than by anyone else in the collection, but we know almost nothing about Japart, and his works appears virtually nowhere outside of the Odhecaton.

Dennis provided 11 pieces, and the chapter members worked their way through 8, and considered facsimiles of the scores with original late 15th century notations.

"We had a very satisfying session; many of the pieces, once worked on and nicely directed by Dennis, turned out to be quite beautiful," Larry Johnson said. "Dennis worked us up to counting whole notes, when the feel was definitely in cut time and the modern signature was 4/2."

After May 20 a late registration fee of \$30 applies.

The University is about 150 miles from Chicago. Vendors on site provide music, instruments, supplies, and repairs. The first event is 7 PM Friday night June 3, and the weekend ends with a Sunday afternoon concert.

For the first time, our old friend Louise Austin will not be able to join us. The leaders plan a slide show about Louise on Friday night. Make Music Chicago

The Make Music Chicago international music festival started in France in 1982, and was introduced in Chicago in 2011. The Chicago chapter decided to participate for the first time in 2014, performing at lunch time at the French Market downtown. The next season found us in a plaza near the flamingoes at Lincoln Park Zoo. Rush Hour Concerts reported that the 2015 event drew over 1500 musicians, who took part in over 250 performances in over 100 venues all over the city. It was great!

This year June 21 falls on a Wednesday. We didn't participate last year, as the event was also on a weekday. Do we want to take part in 2017? Organizers note that the event has been held on weekdays in years past, and to good effect; musicians and venues find that they serve large audiences on a business day that they would not

The Musician's Club of Women was founded in 1875. That means that there must have been a group of elegant but sturdy ladies who rubbed the ashes from the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 off their hands and faces, looked at each other, and said, "We need to start a music club for women!" Today, nearly 150 years later, they are the

oldest musical club in the country and are dedicated to "promoting established and promising women in classical music through a scholarship program and performance opportunities."

Music and More Coming Up

Bach Week Festival (44th annual) returns with two concerts at the Music Institute of Chicago, 1490 Chicago Avenue in Evanston Friday April 28 and Friday May 5, both at 7:30, and a Sunday afternoon concert on May 7 at 2:30 at Anderson Chapel of North Park University, Foster and Spaulding in Chicago. Single tickets are \$30; visit bachweek.org or call 800 838-3006. The May 7 finale features the choral motet *Jesu, meine Freude* and the Orchestral Suite #4 in D. A pair of keyboard concerti are offered for May 5, and Cantatas 54 and 202 on April 28, along with a pair of soprano duets.

Join the First Brigade Brass Band this summer at a pair of Civil War re-enactments in the Chicago area, Saturday July 22 at noon at Four Seasons Park in Lombard, and Saturday August 5 at Carpenters Park in Carpentersville, north of Elgin. In Carpentersville the band will play two circle concerts at 11 AM and 3 PM, and offer a historical program at noon, and then provide music for a period dance at 7 PM. This extremely cool Civil War era band features all authentic 1860s vintage brass instruments, terrific playing, and our own Paul Schmidt. Visit http://1stbrigadeband.org to learn more. And the Civil War events are great fun too for those of us who like hanging out with the obsessive in our midst. I have never been able to ask a question at a Civil War re-enactment that could not be promptly and thoroughly answered, and I once watched an artillery team fire a cannon from behind the Chicago Historical Society toward Lake Shore Drive. Abraham Lincoln regularly shows up, and you can learn about period cooking without being obliged to eat any of it. The food vendors use 21st century ingredients, health standards, and customer service techniques.

A remarkable and inexpensive event for those who like music and have strong hearts would be to take a tour of the carillon tower at **Rockefeller Chapel** at the University of Chicago. The carillon—the second largest musical instrument on the planet, by mass—will be played at 5 PM on Sundays, July 23, 30, August 6, 13, and 20. You could relax on the lawn with a picnic blanket if you like, or you can meet at the front desk of the chapel at 4:30, and enjoy the distinctly medieval experience of climbing 271 narrow winding steps to the carillon studio, and watch the bells being played. Great views of Hyde Park from the tallest landmark in the community. Rockefeller Chapel is at 5850 South Woodlawn. Visit http://rockefeller.uchicago.edu/the-carillon.
