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Chicago Chapter Notes

Lisette Kielson joined us on November 19, offering tone exercises. We played with varying breath pressure, from 1, with so little pressure that we couldn't hear it at all, to 10, with so much breath pressure that we didn't want to. So once again we proved that the recorder has no dynamic range. But we also showed, again, that with the right control the instrument sounds beautiful.

Once we knew that, we got to work. We played a series of very cool modern pieces starting with Hans Ulrich Staeps work, *Syrinx*. That we followed with *Valse Triste* by another contemporary German, Soren Sieg, and closed with Steve Marshall's jazzy arrangement of *The Leaves be Blue*. Lisette returns on January 21, to offer ideas for tuning. And our next meeting is the annual Yuletide concert, December 17.

Also, we are looking for volunteers to bring snacks and drinks for the rest of the monthly meetings this season, January, February, March and April. West Suburban Early Music Society



Remembering Rudy Mundle

Long-time Chicago chapter member Rudy Mundle died in March of 2016 (the May 2016 issue of this newsletter features a tribute to him). Besides playing bagpipes to open each day of the Early Music Festival at the University of Wisconsin/Whitewater—at 6 AM—Rudy was celebrated for his woodworking skills, and in particular, his hand-made instrument stands. Performer's Music used to offer them for sale, for nearly 20 years, until around 2006. Rudy's son Roger just brought Lee Newcomer at Performer's Music the last five stands Rudy built, discovered in his garage. They are available for \$24.95 each. Performer's Music is on the 9th floor of the Fine Arts Building at 410 South Michigan Avenue, and is open until 7 on weekdays and 9 to 5 on weekends. Music and More Coming Up

The Marion Consort offers Music of the Italian Convents, women's voices and organ, on Saturday March 10, 2018 at 7:30 PM at St. Mary of Perpetual Help, 1039 West 32nd Street in Chicago. Tickets \$20; visit www.marionconsort.org. St. Mary of Perpetual Help, built in 1889 to serve the Polish community in Bridgeport, is well worth a visit on its own. This Romanesque/Byzantine parish features a lavishly decorated interior and three soaring domes.

The 58th annual **University of Chicago Folk Music Festival** returns February 9-10. This festival has been around for as long as we have in the Chicago chapter; two days of free workshops and two evening concerts. The chapter has provided a recorder workshop each year since 2014, and we are considering continuing that tradition. So keep Saturday February 10 open.

Early Music Now, founded in Milwaukee in 1986, focuses on presenting only historically informed period instrument performances from before 1800.

The Boston Camerata is joined by the SHARQ Arabic Music Ensemble on December 9 at 5 PM and December 10 at 3 PM at St. Joseph Chapel, Sisters of St. Francis, at 1501 South Layton Boulevard in Milwaukee. They will offer "A Mediterranean Christmas," music from around the Mediterranean Sea as early as 700 years ago.

The Flanders Recorder Quartet of Belgium performs "The Final Chapter: 30 Years" as part of their farewell tour on February 17 at 5 PM at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 914 East Knapp Street in Milwaukee. They offer transcriptions of music for organ and traverso, both old and new works. "The program represents one final burst of colorful recorder fireworks. Join a pre-concert lecture at 4 PM and a reception at intermission.

The Handel Week Festival returns this spring. Sunday February 11 at 3 PM the festival offers the Grand Handel, including the complete Water Music and the Latin sacred cantata Gloria. Saturday February 24 at 7:30 PM will feature the Intimate Handel, music for soprano, violins and basso continuo, including *Laudate pueri dominum* and two trio sonatas. The company has a new holiday tradition of performing the romantic comedy *Twelfth Night* in the Lincoln Park Conservatory, an excellent performance set on a tropical island and using as close to a tropical setting as Chicago can provide in the winter time, the Lincoln Park Conservatory. Susan and I attended on a frigid December evening in 2016, a delightful venture made all the more memorable in the

Victorian era greenhouse by offering some unplanned context. Hawaii inside, Alaska without. Hot humid air rose to the ceiling, touched cold glass, condensed. And fell. At intermission the cast handed out umbrellas. We all savored the irony of the Bard's closing song, offered by the fool, "And the Rain it Raineth Every Day," even as the audience was sitting in a gentle—and indoor—rain.

The performance is free, but donations are gladly welcomed, and richly deserved. Find the Conservatory just south of Fullerton, close to the lakefront. You can exit Lake Shore Drive at Fullerton and park in the Lincoln Park Zoo parking lot, or use the garage just north of the Chicago History Museum. The Conservatory is about a mile walk from the Fullerton L stop, Brown or Red line, and the #74 Fullerton Avenue bus serves the site, or take the #22 Clark Street bus north from the Red line subway stop at Clark & Division.
