# **West Suburban Early Music Society**

The West Suburban Early Music Society met in November to welcome Dennis Sherman once again to lead our group. This time he focused on percussion, since we have a couple of folks in our group quite interested in playing percussion as it adds a special kind of sound and emphasis beyond the recorder that can make a piece come alive. Dennis provided a copy of a page from a handbook from the 1500's that had written out different rhythmic patterns that the drums would rely

on to play for the military bands of France. As we played through selections from early music Dennis demonstrated how drums could be adjusted in their sound by adjusting the rope around the drum. Different areas on the drum skin produce different sounds as well and some of this sounds come out clearer as a specific note and would be used in music that was in that key. As usual with Dennis we got a lot of history and background on percussion and its supportive role in giving music a lot of shading, emphasis, and color. Percussion can be so much more than just keeping time for the band! Thank you, Dennis!

Our next meeting on December 9 will celebrate the advent season. Nancy Chabala will once again bring out holiday gems from her vast collection. This meeting is always a favorite! This is music drawn from the *Llibre Vermell de Montserrat* and the *Cantigas De Santa Maria*, recorded at the Elne Cathedral in France on July 19, 2013. The *Llibre* manuscript was compiled at the monastery of Montserrat near Barcelona around 1399, and features

devotional texts and medieval songs. The *Cantigas*, also Spanish, dates from the early 13<sup>th</sup> century and offers a collection of poems, set to music, devoted to the Virgin Mary. This manuscript also includes a variety of illustrations providing a wealth of information about clothing, musical instruments, food and drink, and the stuff of ordinary life of medieval Castile.

The Newberry Consort offers A Mexican Christmas; Angels in the Convent! Dancing in the Streets! The concert features 17<sup>th</sup> Century music from Mexico City, music made in convents and in town squares. # Beth Longenecker, Recorder Player of the Month

Beth Longenecker recently started attending Tuesday night sessions with the Oak Park Recorder Society, after having started playing recorder two years ago. She is a student of Mary Anne Gardner, and graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania with degrees in piano performance and musicology in 1987. She

graduated from Ohio University College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1991 and is the Associate Dean for Clinical Education at Midwestern University Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine in Downers Grove. Beth and her husband Bill live in Riverside, Illinois.

Beth grew up in eastern Pennsylvania, east of Lancaster, where he father served as a rural doctor. Her high school featured 400 students in four grades, and closed each year for the first day of hunting season and for the first day of the state fair, so that young people in 4H could deliver their projects to the fairgrounds in Harrisburg. The town of Elizabethton, Pennsylvania, itself had two restaurants, a gas station, a blinking vellow light, and a lot of bored teenagers. So Beth practiced piano a lot, having started lessons at age 6. Half way through her degree at IUP she decided she wanted to become a doctor like her father, and arranged a meeting with Dr. Lieget, the director of the pre-med program "In those days I had blue and orange hair. I was a punk rocker," Beth explained. "Dr. Lieget said, 'Music, huh? At least you can count to four. You get one class, mine. If you pass it, we'll talk.' I got an A."

While in medical school, music had to be patient, but hard-earned skills still served her. In her last two years at Ohio University a urologist asked Beth to tune and repair his harpsichord (she had learned how in college) and as a reward offered her a key to his house so that she could play his piano whenever she wanted. This same urologist is now retired and a violinist with a symphony orchestra in Orange County, California. He had owned a Stradivarius violin, and while at IUP formed a trio with an anesthesiologist who played cello and Beth on piano.

After medical school Beth spent two years in a residency in neurosurgery, but a back injury that should have sidelined her for six weeks gained her just two days off, so she decided to find some other type of medicine that she didn't, well, hate. That led her to a residency in emergency medicine in Newark, New Jersey for three years, and from there spent a year in a hospital in Brooklyn and seven more at another in the Bronx. From New York she moved to Miami to serve as the director of residency at a hospital there, and then was invited to help start a new medical school in Mississippi. Four years ago she was invited to join the faculty at the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Beth and her husband love to dance, including swing, Zydeco, and Cajun, so each year they travel to the Christmas Country Dance School at Berea College in Berea, Kentucky. Like she said, they love to dance. But seven days of relentless dancing can drain anyone's enthusiasm, so Christmas of 2016, in pursuit of variety, she started taking recorder lessons at Berea as well. "I

think I had five hours of lessons in five days, and I really, really liked it," she said. The instructor, Wayne Hankin, helped her find a local teacher, and Mary Anne told Beth about the OPRS. She has been attending Chicago chapter meetings too. So, welcome Beth Longnecker when you see her, a new recorder player.
