Chicago Chapter

And now, we close our 60th annual season with our spring concert on May 19.

We opened with *Christie Eleison* (2003) by Fulvio Caldini, a wonderful modern work that we had enjoyed in months past. Then we worked through Peter Beck's *14 Days in Georgia* and Gabrielli's *Canzona seconda*. These are the two pieces we will plan to perform as a chapter for our spring concert. Recorder workshop

Another grand day spent playing recorder, 24 musicians gathering at Covenant Presbyterian on April 13 with Clea Galhano for our 2019 workshop. Many thanks to Larry Johnson and to the rest of the board for their hard work in organizing the event, and providing food, advertising, and materials. This workshop was really fun, a lot of terrific playing and sessions that ran over our scheduled breaks. The first piece we worked on (for an hour), a Renaissance *Ave Maria* by Tomas de la Victoria, was worth the price of admission by itself. We continually drilled on sections, and improved. "You have a pretty good music director," Clea said, and she was right.

Next, we worked on John Wilbye's *Softly, O, Softly Drop my Eyes*, one of those mopey love songs that Elizabethan composers were famous for. We read through lyrics like these:

Softly, O softly drop, mine eyes, lest you be dry, and make my heart with grief to melt and die. Now pour our tears apace, now stay, O heavy case, O sour-sweet woe, alas, alas, O grief, O joy, why strive you so? Can pains and joys at once in one poor heart consent?

Then sigh and sing, rejoice, lament. Ay me, ay me, O passions strange and violent! Was never poor wretch so sore tormented? Nor joy nor grief can make my heart contented: for while with joy I look on high, down, down I fall with grief and die.

You might think that this guy could really have used a prescription for Prozac. Fortunately, anti-depressants were not available in the 16th century, so John Wilbye turned his despair (?) into splendid music instead.

We divided into two choirs for Holst's beautiful *Ave Maria*, and then dove into a series of Celtic folk pieces, *The Road to Lisdoonvarna* and *The Star of the County Down*, and finishing with a Brazilian work, *Brazil*, and *The Shadow of Your Smile* by Johnny Mandel. I don't feel like I deserve all of this fine music making, but I'll take it. I have enjoyed a grand 13-year tour since I started taking lessons with Nancy Chabala in May of 2006.
