#### **Todd Wetherwax, 1951 - 2019**

Friends of recorder playing and of the Early Music Festival at the University of Wisconsin/Whitewater lost another friend, mentor, and teacher when Todd Wetherwax died last June 20. He was 67 years old.

Larry Johnson joined Todd's class at Whitewater when he was a new recorder player over 30 years ago. It was his first experience with playing with a large group, and playing one on a part. He was alone on bass in a five-part 16th century German work. Larry was supposed to have the first entrance. "When Todd set the count and pointed to me on beat one, I failed to start, expecting other people to be playing with me," Larry said. "Todd just looked at his directing finger and said 'I know this was working this morning.""

A life-long resident of the San Francisco Bay area, Todd was born in Burbank, California and grew up as a part of a large extended Italian family. He learned to play piano and clarinet early; later, when his family moved to Mammoth Lakes, California when he was a junior, he learned to ski, too. He loved the mountains, and skiing down those same mountains. Todd competed on the Ski Team in both high school and college.

He finished a bachelor's degree in Music at the University of California, Riverside in 1973 and studied oboe performance at Humboldt State University, before finishing a master's degree in Music History and Musicology at the University of Wisconsin in 1978. His love of early music began at Riverside, where he played

recorders, shawms, cornettos, krummhorns and violas de gamba in the Early Music Collegium.

Todd played oboe primarily, as well as English horn and clarinet, with the Albany Chamber Orchestra and for ten years was principal oboe with the Castro Valley Chamber Orchestra. In recent years Todd played baroque oboe and recorder with an informal ensemble. He continued to play clarinet with the Hillside Woodwind Quintet until recently, where he was a founding member. He also enjoyed playing in the orchestra pit for local community theater productions.

Todd also founded and served as music director for the San Francisco Consort for 25 years. This group received grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities to provide educational historic music programs for under-served communities across the Bay Area. Since 1985, Todd was the owner of Classical Editions, a publisher of sheet music for chamber ensembles. Todd taught for many years at Whitewater, and at the same festival at Milton College, Wisconsin before that.

Todd had hoped to make a living as a professional musician, teaching private students, performing, and publishing music. But it's hard to support a family that way, especially in the San Francisco Bay area! He took an opportunity to teach high school music at Emeryville Unified School District to provide a more stable income, but he quickly realized that he had missed his calling. He was an excellent teacher, and an excellent music teacher. But when the superintendent learned of his technology skills, he switched within a year or two to teaching computer science. For 23 years Todd taught computers and served as a technology coordinator for three different school systems in central California. After retirement, he and his wife Kay enjoyed making music together, and traveling throughout Europe and Mexico. They toured Spain, Austria, Belgium, England, and the Netherlands in recent years. Todd loved Paris, and they

loved to sit together, at the end of a day, beside the Grand Canal in Venice. He loved baseball too, regularly turning trips to music workshops into opportunities to take in games at Major League parks in Minneapolis, Kansas City, and Chicago.

As Larry Johnson continued to attend the Early Music Festival at Whitewater each year, he was happy to regularly buy music arrangements Todd had published. They were fun to play and sounded good, and were often educational, too, including a pair of German works by Franz Tunder and Heinrich Schutz that Larry carries around with him so he is prepared to play whenever he finds himself in a room with enough recorder players. "I feel indebted to Todd for his wonderful taste and the many great selections that he chose to arrange over the years, which I have continued to play ever since," Larry said. "I will miss the annual opportunity to see what new old musical treasures I can find in Todd's music booth at Whitewater."

Todd and his wife Kay recently celebrated their 27th anniversary, and made their home in Castro Valley, California. Despite a struggle against cancer that lasted for 18 months, Todd continued to enjoy music making, food and wine, and travel until just a month before his death. Besides Kay, and a great many friends and colleagues, Todd is also survived by his daughters Lieske and Julie, step-daughter Sarah, and grandchildren Isabella and Nico. He is also survived by his mother, a sister, two brothers, and several nieces and nephews.


