# **Chicago Chapter**

We cannot be stopped. Uniformly splendid gatherings for the Chicago Chapter continue. For our November Meeting, 17 joined us as Lisette continued her musical theme of 'Molto Expressivo'. We first worked on the moderately chromatic but very satisfying *Fantasia No. 3* by Henry Purcell, and then took on *Fortuna* by Ludwig Senfl, which had the cantus and tenor lines play slower variations on the tune, while the fairly ornamented alto and bass lines got a good workout. Finally, we made plans to play the exquisite *Abendlieb*, *Op. 69 #3*, by Josef Rheinbeger (1839-1901) for Yuletide—and Glen Shannon's Friendship Canzona for our May concert! We plan ahead around here, but mostly, we just enjoy making beautiful harmonies together.



# **West Suburban Early Music Society**

Dennis Sherman led WSEMS members at the November meeting in music composed by Anthony St. Pierre. Most of the pieces that Dennis introduced us to were based on known pieces. For example, All & Some is based on a medieval carol, Fantasy on Frere Jacques is based on the familiar tune, and Cornefyf is derived from a tune by Purcell. Following the break, Dennis directed us in fun pieces for the holiday written by St. Pierre.



These included Jingle Bell Waltz, Good King What's-His-Name, O Tannen Tree, Wes Hale! and Twelve Days of Christmas Rush. St. Pierre's compositions are available in the ARS Members' Library catalog. Many thanks to Dennis for his time in leading and guiding us!

The Rembrandt Chamber Players perform on Sunday, February 16, 2020 at 3 PM at the Nichols Concert Hall of the Music Institute of Chicago, 1490 Chicago Avenue, Evanston, and on Tuesday, February 18 at the Cliff Dweller's Club, 200 South Michigan Avenue, at7:30 PM. The works include the Piano Trio in B-flat Major ("Archduke"), the Duet with Two Obligato Eyeglasses for viola and bass (yes, that really is the name of the piece), and the String Trio No. 4 in D Major. The Hairpin Arts Center is at 2810 North Milwaukee Avenue in Chicago, a short walk from the Logan Square L stop on the Blue Line.
