Chicago Chapter News

Welcome to the 2020-2021 Season! We've all waited a whole year to meet and play together again, and we certainly plan to this season. We have managed to meet, in small groups, indoors and out, over the past months. Between our cautious in-person sessions, and our continued online chapter meetings, we've managed to maintain an active chapter for all of our members!

For those meeting in person starting on September 19, our meetings at Covenant Presbyterian will run from 1 PM to 4 PM. The first hour will feature freeform playing, with our formal music presentation from 2 to 4 PM. The meeting will end at 4 PM by request of the church. This season Lisette Kielson returns as our music director.

We will begin the season with regular chapter meetings, possibly in hybrid format, allowing members to attend on Zoom or in person. If circumstances require, we will return to meeting on Zoom.

Hello everyone! I am so excited to return as music director of the Chicago Chapter and really looking forward to reconnecting with vaccinated members in person at our first meeting on September 19th. I plan to revisit some joyous large scale works such as Glen Shannon's *Friendship Canzona*, Peter Siebert's *Festival Music*, and more! In addition, I will bring some wonderfully challenging duos made more accessible by in-person playing (Telemann & Sieg)!

If we meet on Zoom, I will guide, instead, a virtual 'how to practice' session, addressing various aspects of technique and musicality through scales, etudes, and solos, culminating in duets for intermediate SAT recorder players.—*Lisette Kielson*

May 15 Spring Concert, and remembrance

for Hilde Staniulis

Earl Manning (1927 - 2020) Viola Manning (1930 - 2021)

We learned in May of Earl Manning's death on June 27, 2020, and of Viola Manning's death last April 10. Viola Manning signed the charter to form the Chicago chapter of the American Recorder Society in January of 1963, and both joined the West Suburban Early Music Society shortly after the group formed in 1983. They were married in February of 1961, missing their 60th anniversary by seven months.

The pair met while playing recorder, and kept going with recorder together for 50 years with various ensembles and two ARS chapters. Their daughter Cindi recalls that they spent every weekend at the King Richard's Faire (now the Bristol Renaissance Faire) for ten years. "I spent all day there hanging out while Mom & Dad played recorders in full costume and in the heat," she said. "But they loved it and it made a great family memory." Lynette Colmey used to join them with the group they hosted in their home on Monday nights in the 1980s. "The Mannings were gracious and upbeat," Lynette said. "They gave us a little

rocking chair for our newly adopted daughter who was 4 years old at the time. We still have that chair and it is now waiting for the newest family member (now 7 months old) to grow into it. Because of this gift and also because of the fun experience of playing with the Mannings, I think of them often." Nancy VanBrundt observed that Viola and Earl Manning were stalwarts in recorder events near and far. She found them at a workshop by Eva Legene at New Harmony in southern Indiana in 1995.

They were both passionate musicians. Viola graduated from the Indiana University School of Music in 1952 as a pianist. She joined the Chicago chapter of the Sigma Alpha Iota, a music fraternity, that year, and gained a variety of honors, the last being the Rose of Dedication in 2016. Besides recorder, Earl played the bassoon, crumhorn, rackett, violin, clarinet and tuba, continuing with his instruments until his vision failed in his late 80s. "There was always music in the house as I was growing up," their daughter Cindi remembered. "Whether it was WFMT on the radio or live recorder music, classical was always around."

Born and raised in Chicago, Earl served in the Merchant Marines during World War II, and was drafted into the Army in 1950 to serve in the Korean War. After he was discharged in 1952 he returned to the merchant marine, before spending his career working in the accounting department for RR Donnelley. When Viola moved to Chicago she worked for the American Broadcasting Company and for Kraft Foods, followed by a variety of part time assignments, including "picture lady" at her daughter's middle school, library assistant, and manager of her own dog grooming business. After Earl retired, she worked temp at McDonald's HQ in Oak Brook Terrace, teaching younger people how to work with computer systems. She also enjoyed photography, including developing her own black & white images.

Her last career opportunity at McDonald's served to pay for her other passion, fiber arts. Viola excelled in rug hooking, spinning, weaving, embroidery, basket weaving, sewing, crochet, and knitting. She was honored for 50 years of volunteer service at the Graue Mill and Museum in Oak Brook in 2018. Viola learned how to spin and weave wool, flax, alpaca, cotton and even pet hair so she could demonstrate these old world skills to museum visitors. She was also an active member of the After Hours Weaving Guild, the Illinois Prairie Spinners, and the Weavers Guild of the North Shore.

Viola and Earl Manning are apparently the last surviving founding members of the Chicago chapter, which started meeting in 1959. We owe them a lot; passion leads to more passion. They devoted their lives to the instrument, and inspired others to follow. As we begin our 63rd season in a few weeks, after a difficult pandemic season of 2020-2021, we remember those we have lost in recent months, Earl & Viola Manning, and Hilde Staniulis. And we look forward to many more good years ahead.

The West Suburban Early Music Society met outdoors for their final meeting of the 2020-2021 season on May 2 in Downers Grove. About 10 players played mostly medieval and Renaissance works, like *Farnaby's Humor*, *O Sacrum Convivium*, and *Dixit Maria*. We were accompanied by birds and wind (and traffic); we introduced a novel way to handle historic music in the spring in northern Illinois by pinning up two pages of *Dixit Maria* at a time, pausing half way through, and bringing up pages 3 and 4 to follow. But that was as much innovation as we were inclined to pursue. Despite the supposed convenience of modern technology, several present agreed that displaying sheet music from the 16th century on an iPad or tablet would be sinful.

The group met several times over the summer months to play together outside. The Board decided that we will continue to meet outside until conditions improve.
