Chicago Chapter News

Lisette directed our February 19 meeting with dances by Attaignant, and a fantasy by du Caurroy. We also played the Charpentier work, *Le Malade Imaginaire*, which we plan to play as a chapter for our May concert. If you would like to join the chapter in playing this piece for the concert, let Mark Dawson know. We will plan to work on this piece at our March and April meetings.

An excellent crowd, 18 people joined us, and we enjoyed three hours of fine music making. For our first hour Nancy Chabala directed us in playing works by Matias and Praetorius, and especially the elegant choral work, *Abendlied*, by Josef Reinburger (1839-1901). Then, Lisette started with exercises, but this time, physical exercises too, shoulder rolls and torso stretches, the sorts of stretching that Lisette might complete to prepare for performance. Thus ready to strike, we next did musical exercises, practicing playing slowly, which is surprisingly hard to do.

For our March 19 meeting we welcome Mirja Lorenz to direct us again, from easy to fun and more challenging, works by Melchior Frank, Henry Purcell, Hans Leo Hassler, Giovanni Gastoldi, and more.

Laura put together parts for *Huict Bransles de Poictu* by Claude Gervaise so that we could play the music without stopping as you would at a real dance. We found that there had to be some adjustments for the endings of sections to keep the count but enjoyed playing the lively music.



We stayed in Renaissance world by following with *Ricercare a Quattro* by Andrea Gabrieli. And we

wrapped up our whole group playing with a modern piece, *Getting to Know You*, by David Kemp. Following a break, we divided into two groups. This time the Alternate Altos played only alto on two Baroque works: *Sonata IX* by Johann Mattheson, and *Sonata Quarta* by Michel Blavet. Marguerite Re facilitated the DaCapo group as they played *Loth to Depart* by Giles Farnaby and *Lamentation for the Death of His Second Wife* by Niel Gow.

We meet again on March 12th at 2 PM at the Friends Meetinghouse. 


Lisette Kielson at Pilgrim Congregational Church in Oak Park, Sunday February 26, for the Handel Week Festival.

Lisette drew the Sonata in C Major from her "Big Red Book" of Handel sonatas, a well-worn copy of *The Complete Sonatas for Alto Recorder & Continuo* compiled by Lasocki. These recorder sonatas are not as flashy as the works of Telemann or Vivaldi, but they are, simply, flawless. They are to recorder music what an omelet would be from a fine chef—nothing fancy, but cooked to perfection. So Lisette offered us Handel's Omelet in C Major for Recorder with Cello and Harpsichord accompaniment.

The Handel Week Festival celebrates 25 years next season. The concerts in February and March of 2024 will feature Haydn's *Creation* oratorio, the complete *Water Music* by Handel, and Handel's *Gloria*. After presenting a festival every year since 2000, but they are nowhere close to performing all of the works that Franz Josef Handel produced.
