Chicago Chapter News

After a fine start to our new season on September 18, an excellent gathering of 18 players under Lisette's direction, we would encourage you to join us for our next meeting on October 15. A lot of solid playing, starting with exercises, talking about holding the instrument and fingering. Lisette mentioned that we can skip notes in order to keep up with the group, and she also said that playing fast pieces demands articulation and rhythm, but not playing louder! Long runs of 8th and 16th notes tempt us to increase the volume. It is important to concentrate on your breath pressure.



Then, music by Richard Deering (1580–1630), his *Almaine*, followed by *Missa Brevis* by Dietrich Buxtehude, the Kyrie and Credo. Solemn sacred music for the mass yielded to a fast Spanish folk tunes from Pedro Rimonte (1563-1627), based on the Spanish form of Villancico. We finished with a modern work, Raymond Harvey's *Suite #1*.

For our October meeting, Nancy Chabala will provide her own music as she leads us for our first hour of playing together. Nancy will also lead before the February 2024 meeting, as well as after our Yuletide and spring concerts, part of chapter tradition. For the 2-4 PM playing session, Lisette will lead us in a pair of Renaissance trios (SAT / TBgB optional), a 21st century Fantasia (SATB) by Will Ayton based on 14th century Guillaume de Machaut's *Douce Dame*, Johann Strauss

Jr.'s Persian March (SSAATB), and our own Chicago Chapter member Peter Beck's *La Marche des Rois* (SATB). We will plan to perform Beck's piece at our Yuletide Concert in December! Please join us for music making on October 15.

The West Suburban Early Music Society met on Sunday, September 10th for our kick-off meeting of the season. A small but enthusiastic group played Renaissance through modern music. The Renaissance pieces included three movements from *Lowener Tanzbuch* by Pierre Phalese (1571, three English country dances from the book of music, Playford Dances, and *Kommt, Seelen, dieser Tag* by Bach. We enjoyed playing St. Augustine Rag, a recent release from ARS; the piece was written by William Ruthenberg. We played *A minuit fut fait un reveil* by Anthony St. Pierre and *Giddy-up*! a cowboy song medley of traditional tunes arranged by David Kemp. We attempted to play *S-O-S* by Anthony St. Pierre with its 12/8 time signature and quick tempo. It was a challenging piece!

We are looking forward to the direction of Dennis Sherman at our October 8th meeting at the Friends Meetinghouse in Downers Grove. Dennis reported the following: "We will look at Nightingales: whether the English "Nightingale," Italian "Rossignol," German "Nachtigall," or some other language, there have been many pieces titled "Nightingale" over the centuries. West Suburban Early Music Society (WSEMS) has been a member of the American Recorder Society for 40 years! Bill Nelson, the first director of the group, supplied the following information about WSEMS. "The chapter was formed about 1980. The prime mover was Doris Van Pelt (now deceased). We agreed to move ahead, so an application was done, a charter was offered, and a number of us signed it. Doris was insistent that it not be called "recorder society, but an Early Music Society", and so the name came to be. Meetings began shortly after that and the Chapter has continued non-stop since then."

Our small but enthusiastic group celebrated with cupcakes, a balloon, and a fun selfie picture. Chris and Nancy Culp joined WSEMS in 1983 and Chris has been a faithful member for 40 years. Nancy took a break due to family responsibilities but has been a member for many years. Congratulations WSEMS!

Recorders in the United Kingdom

The London *Guardian* published a remarkable article about the recorder in the United Kingdom in August:

The author noted another recent article in the Guardian saying the number of children playing recorder in England has dropped by 80% over the last ten years, and the instrument faces the possibility of disappearing from English schools entirely. The recent pandemic hastened the decline of the recorder in the UK, but also of woodwinds in general, as the instruments were seen as vectors for spreading the disease. That's ironic, as we were told the opposite—in some places recorder playing increased in 2020 and 2021 here. The recorder was seen as a perfect apartment instrument for those avoiding crowds, and it in fact playing recorder was thought of as considerably safer than singing in an ensemble.
